President's Message March, 2013

Hi Shipmates,

This has really been a tough couple of months. We were at the ship at the beginning of February for a mini work party. Four of us, John Hudak, Dave Harhager, John Miller and I, went to Patriots Point to get some small jobs done before our large work party in April. As it turned out, we didn't get too much accomplished. Miller and Harhager pulled up the old carpet in the CPO Lounge only to find holes in the deck. Hudak went to work and welded patches over the rusted out deck.

John came up with an idea on how we could get potable water supplied to the ship that would feed one urinal, one wash basin and the coffee pot. I went up to Bob Howard's office and talked with Bob about the problems of not having an operational head. He gave me the OK to get the plumbing hooked up. While waiting to hear from someone with a septic tank truck to give us some idea what they would need for us to make the hook up we ran out of time to get started.

Since returning home we've gotten in touch with a company that will come to meet with us at the ship while we are there for our next work party. Hopefully they can advise us with recommendations on what can be done.

In the mean time, our friend Jeff Jacobs, who is a member of the Board of Directors of the Patriots Point Foundation, called to tell me that the Foundation is going to donate the tank and a few hundred dollars in Lowe's gift cards for us to get the pipe and fittings. Jeff has been working his butt off helping us to get the ship back in shape. We hope to have the water hooked up and the drain piping installed and in operation during our next work party.

I have to apologize to the work party guys for not being able to give you a date for the next work party. As of this date, March 6, we still don't have any berthing spaces onboard the carrier open as they are all taken by the Boy Scouts. We can't complain because the Scout Program is one of Patriots Point's main sources of income. They have as many as 700 scouts staying overnight and the spring is the busiest time of the year for their scouting program. I am in constant communication with the persons involved in the scheduling of the campers who stay on the Yorktown. I will notify everyone when we finally get a date for our work party.

We realize that we have been sleeping and eating on our ship for 30 years since she was brought to Patriots Point but while she was gone for 3 years she lost her "Grandfather Right" for us to use our ship the way we always did. As a result, the new fire regulations now define the Laffey as a BUILDING??? We now have to comply with rules made for hotels.

We can no longer cook in the CPO galley unless a COMMERCIAL fire suppression system is put in at the grill. (Which is electric and only about $3' \times 3'$) I don't see (personally) why we can't just have a fire

extinguisher hanging right next to the grill (just in case). We also can't sleep aboard unless we get a sprinkler system put in. Of course this is cost prohibitive.

The good news..... We can have our meals there if we don't use the grill. During the mini work party we had cereal, toast and bacon, egg and cheese sandwiches (cooked in the microwave). The sandwiches were Hudak's recipe and were very delicious. For lunch we had horse c...oops.....cold cut sandwiches. So it can be done but we sure miss the eggs, bacon, potatoes and sausage that we used to have on the grill. We would cause all kinds of problems with the Patriots Point employees because as they came to work they could smell our bacon cooking......now we aren't allowed to cause work stoppages....ha ha!

Jill Michel called tonight and informed that she is reserving 35 rooms in New Orleans for the 2013 reunion. The dates are Sept. 8th to the 11th, 2013. She will have a more detailed explanatory article later in this newsletter. It looks as if the turnout will be sparse this year in New Orleans. As of this writing we only have 21 rooms filled. We are obligated to fill 85% of the rooms that we block off. Please let Jill know ASAP if you will be attending the reunion. Remember, if you wait too late you may not get a room...and you'll be missing a wonderful travel destination!!!

Another task that needs to be taken care of is a tree planting at Patriots Point with a plaque honoring the 32 crewmembers that were killed at Okinawa aboard the Laffey on 16 April 1945. We have obtained permission from Patriots Point to plant a tree and erect the plaque. We are in the process of getting this done. I have been told that to plant a Live Oak sapling in the summer will not work. The best planting time is in the fall. The heat in the summer is too stressful on a young plant. Stay tuned for more info on this project.

Please bear with us as we try to get these matters taken care of. It seems that everything we try to do these days has so many strings attached that it takes twice the time as it used to.

"THE TIMES THEY ARE A CHANGIN"

Announced in the May 21, 2012 edition of Navy News by the Chief of Naval Personnel public affairs:

WASHINGTON -- NAVADMIN 164/12, released May 18, announced the chief of naval operations'

(CNO) approval of a number of changes to uniforms and uniform wear policy.

"These uniform changes are the direct result of Sailor and leadership feedback," said Rear Adm. Tony Kurta, director, Military Personnel Plans and Policy. "Updating Navy uniforms is part of outfitting the 21st Century Sailor, ensuring our Sailors have practical uniforms they want and that represent our proud naval heritage while reflecting advances in clothing technology and design."

An improved design of the male E1-E6 Service Dress Blue (SDB) Uniform, incorporating a side zipper on the jumper and a hidden center zipper on the trousers, is approved. The uniform is scheduled to begin distribution in October 2015, at Recruit Training Command, Great Lakes, and Fleet availability is expected by October 2018. Specific details regarding fleet availability will be announced in a future NAVADMIN.

The E1-E6 men's and women's Service Dress White (SDW) jumper approved design improvements include incorporating a side zipper, front and rear yoke, Navy blue piping on the flap, and sleeve cuffs with Navy blue piping and button fasteners. Introduction of the new E1-E6 SDW will begin October 2015, at Recruit Training Command, Great Lakes. Fleet roll out will begin by October 2018. Specific details regarding Fleet availability will be announced in a future NAVADMIN.

The contemporary design for Service Dress Khaki (SDK) is approved for optional wear. Detailed guidance on the occasion for wear and Fleet availability will be announced in a future NAVADMIN.

EDITOR'S COMMENT: With these new side jumper zippers it seems to me that the new lads will never have the "joyful" experience of attempting to "pull on" their jumpers after a slight increase in weight and size!! The reality of this: Yes, I know....The cleaners/laundry were at fault back then!!

ANOTHER COMMENT: I'm not certain if the above uniform changes are still proceeding as planned. I've seen nothing recently on this matter and the 2013 military budget situation might delay the implementation of these intentions.

THE USS RONALD REAGAN (CVN76)

Seeing it next to the Arizona Memorial (upper left) really puts its size into perspective ... ENORMOUS!



When the Bridge pipes 'Man the Rail' there is a lot of rail to man on this monster: shoulder to shoulder, around 4.5 acres. Her displacement is about 100,000 tons with a full complement.

Some Important details:

Top speed exceeds 30 knots, powered by two nuclear reactors that can operate for more than 20 years without refueling

- 1. Expected to operate in the fleet for about 50 years!
- 2. Carries over 80 combat aircraft.
- 3. Three arresting cables can stop a 28-ton aircraft going 150 miles per hour in less than 400 feet

Size

- 1. She towers 20 stories above the waterline.
- 2. 1092 feet long; is nearly as long as the Empire State Building is tall!
- 3. Flight deck covers 4.5 acres

- 4. Distillation plants provide 400,000 gallons of fresh water from sea water daily, enough for 2,000 homes.
- 5. Nearly 30,000 light fixtures and 1,325 miles of cable and wiring 1,400 telephones.
- 6. 14,000 pillowcases and 28,000 sheets.

SPEAKING OF FOOD...

Better Chow, Cooked from Scratch: Navy Food Management Team in Action

SAN DIEGO (NNS) -- When NAVSUP Fleet Logistics Center (FLC) San Diego's Navy Food Management Team (NFMT) crossed the brow to depart USS Stockdale (DDG 106) Jan. 13, they knew the crew would be eating well.

NAVSUP FLC San Diego's NFMT visited the guided-missile destroyer for a four-day period to conduct a routine assessment for the ship's food service divisions.

The assessment - or "assist visit" - covered areas like sanitation practices, inventory procedures, record keeping and inspection. Unlike most shipboard assessments, however, there was an added incentive for the crew at the end: better meals, cooked from scratch.

"What we do is conduct our assessments, and then based on the results, we conduct specialized training in the areas we think could benefit them, but we always place a special emphasis on scratch cooking," said Chief Warrant Officer Andrew Pickins, the team's lead analyst.

Scratch cooking is a hands-on cooking style that uses fresh ingredients and recipes to create homemade meals that are individually crafted from start to finish. Due to the operational tempo and manpower restrictions in the Navy's galleys, daily

menus often alternate between heat-and-serve dishes and freshly prepared selections.

"We look at the standard course menus with the culinary specialists and teach them how they can spice them up," said Pickins. "We focus on teaching them to cook from scratch as much as possible, and we'd like to see 50 percent of all meals prepared that way."

The team's goal is to enhance the skills of culinary specialists to provide better food service throughout the Navy's general messes. The NFMT is comprised of Sailors in culinary rates at pay grades at or above E-7 which, according to Pickins, ensures the trainers not only boast finely-tuned culinary skills, but also have the firsthand experience of running their own food service operations at sea and ashore.

Aboard Stockdale, NFMT trainers scanned the day's pre-planned menu of chicken chalupas, beef tacos, beef stir-fry and egg foo young and taught the Sailors to make each dish from scratch, rather than using heat-and-serve alternatives. The end result: wholesome, hearty meals, freshly crafted, and seasoned to perfection.

"Stockdale received us very well," said Pickins.
"The Sailors were very receptive to the training we provided and I think they enjoyed the meals they created. When we train them one day and we return to see them applying those skills the next day, we consider that a success."

The Navy Food Management Team conducts assist visits for commands across the west coast every 18 months to provide CS-types with both refresher and advanced training.

"We're providing Sailors with a skill, and in the end it makes a big difference throughout the fleet," said Pickins. "Taking something out of a box and heating it up is not a skill, and that's not the kind of cooking that will make them competitive when they get out of the Navy and go into the private sector.

When culinary specialists take scratch cooking skills and put them to work, everybody benefits and morale improves. The cooks take more pride in what they do and Sailors on the mess decks get to enjoy some really good food."

While at-sea staples like hot dogs and chicken nuggets will never disappear completely, the

training offered by NFMT professionals ensures that Sailors answering the call of duty are offered more selections that bring them a little taste of home.

HM-M-M-M-M-M – Do we have any culinary specialists available to help feed our hungry attendees during any work party? Sadly, and unfortunately, we can no longer <u>prepare meals</u> onboard the ship!! Scrub that request for our own (Laffey) culinary specialists!!

Korean War veteran, 82, granted

Dying wish to walk deck of old ship

MOUNT PLEASANT, S.C. – Korean War veteran Gerald Bowman gamely walked up the gangplank to board the ship he had not seen in almost six decades. The 82-year-old is suffering from congestive heart failure with only about a year to live and his dying wish was to walk the decks of the USS Laffey on which he served four years, including three tours off Korea.

Wearing a USS Laffey hat, he led reporters through the ship at the Patriots Point Naval and Maritime Museum on Charleston Harbor Friday, stopping by his old bunk and then into the engine room where as a machinist mate he worked, sometimes in sweltering temperatures of more than 120 degrees. He choked up and paused when asked how it felt to be back.

"I just wanted to come back and see actually what happened to me in my early 20s," the Elkins, Ark., man said. "I think the bottom line was the four years changed me. I was a different person when I left."

His Navy experiences included a 28-day stretch when, from off the Korean coast, the Laffey poured shells at targets on the mainland.

He described how the ship would roll from side to side when the guns were fired and how he would go out with a couple other sailors in small wooden boats to clear mines. It had to be done at night, with no lights and no weapons except for knives. The metal from the guns might have exploded the floating mines, he said.

"I asked him why he volunteered to do something so dangerous. He said it was because he was 20 years old," his daughter Kim Bowman Billings said.

Father and daughter were watching television coverage of the Laffey being brought back to the museum just over a year ago after undergoing \$9 million in repairs.

"It just came on and he said that's my ship. He said how he wished he could walk her one more time and he could even show me the bunk where he slept," Billings said.

Bowman said he didn't know what had become of the ship until he saw the TV coverage.

The Laffey got its nickname "The Ship That Would not Die" in World War II when it was attacked in 1945 off Japan. It suffered 103 casualties when hit by four bombs and five kamikaze planes. The vessel was mothballed after the war but reactivated for Korea.

Bowman's trip was arranged after Billings contacted the Dream Foundation, a California-based organization granting wishes for adults and their families facing life-threatening illnesses. Hardees also help arrange the trip.

"This is my gift to him," Billings said. "I think it's the most wonderful thing in the world."

POSSIBLE CHANGES TO RETIREMENT

A sweeping new plan to overhaul the Pentagon's retirement system would give some benefits to all troops and phase out the 20-year cliff vesting system that has defined military careers for generations, the Military Times newspapers reported.

The plan calls for a corporate-style benefits program that would contribute money to troops' retirement savings account rather than the promise of a future monthly pension, according to a new proposal from an influential Pentagon advisory board.

The move would save the Pentagon money -- at a time when it's being asked to cut \$400 billion -- and benefit troops who leave with less than 20 years of service.

The yearly contributions might amount to about 16.5 percent of a member's annual pay and would be deposited into a mandatory version of the Thrift Savings Plan, the military's existing 401(k)-style account that now does not include government matching contributions, according to the Times.

Proponents said the plan would allow more flexibility for service members, who could decide how they want to invest their retirement savings, and for the military, which would be allowed to offer higher contributions to troops who deploy frequently or take hardship assignments.

Editors Comment: The military has been taking a disproportionate level of budgetary cuts which are being identified as reductions in annual budgetary expenditures by the Federal Government. With "Sequestration" (A reduction of **the increase** in the budget) we have an additional consideration of the ramifications of the above Military Times article.

Description: The Cabildo is one of the most historically significant buildings in America. Built between 1795 and 1799 to replace a structure that burned in the 1794 fire, the Cabildo served as the seat of government in New Orleans during the Spanish colonial period and is the location where the Louisiana Purchase was signed in 1803.

It closes only on Christmas Day and on the day an occasional Hurricane passes too close to New Orleans. The Original Cafe Du Monde is a traditional coffee shop. Its menu consists of dark roasted Coffee and Chicory, Beignets, White and Chocolate Milk, and fresh squeezed Orange Juice. The coffee is served Black or Au Lait. Au Lait means that it is mixed half and half with hot milk. Beignets are square French -style doughnuts, lavishly covered with powdered sugar.
