### PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE MAY, 2016

It's another spring in the neighborhood, and it is a beautiful one too! We have a lot going on this year including work parties, reunions, raffles, etc. As for winter, it is long gone and but a distant memory. For those in the membership who had to shovel a lot of snow this year, think spring!!

Our early spring work party was an absolute success! I have never seen our guys pull together more than they did this past April. We decided to buy our own paint to alleviate a financial burden on Patriots Point. In comes Jeff Jacobs..... He told me that he would find someone to DONATE, (Yes, DONATE!) the paint. Shortly thereafter, he found International Paint Co. in Norfolk, VA. They donated 30 gallons of Haze Gray and 15 gallons of Deck Gray plus 2 gallons of thinner and 2 gallons of primer. We are estimating that this was valued at \$3,000.00. They even paid the shipping! This is high quality paint and should last quite a while. Jeff knew we were looking for a power washer so he provided the name of a nearby company: Hughes Tool Rental in Mt. Pleasant. They let us use their 4000 psi washer for the entire weekend for free! We are now looking into renting a man-lift to paint the high portions of the superstructure in the fall. Mike Pereira is in contact with a company now. We will find out how that turns out in the next edition. Needs, needs, we have so many needs!

Jill is working really hard on the reunion. The hotel prices in Charleston have gone through the roof. She found a nice hotel near the airport for this year: Double-Tree by Hilton in N. Charleston. We hope that you all will be attending the reunion this year: They are such fun!! Be a part of the association's activities, dine together, laugh together, "drink together", tell tall tales together, witness the memorial ceremony in honor of those KIA and wounded in 1945, and refresh old friendships (Many you haven't seen since your onboard Laffey days!) We had some very important attendees at this years' spring work party including Hilary Wagner, Julian Winston, Phillip Winston and Phillip Winston, Jr. who represented Adm. Becton. Jill Michel was there for her dad, John Michel. Danny Essig, Jr and Anthony D'Amore were there for Danny Essig. Walter Laskowski, his wife and niece were there to honor their uncle, Frank Laskowski WT3. And our friend SC State Rep. James Smith sat in the front row and honored his grandfather Lt. Paul Smith. It was great having our WWII heroes represented by so many family members during the past work party.

We've been notified that Rod Morgan's son is in the hospital after a major stroke. He is 59. Please keep Rod and family in your thoughts and prayers. Dave Harhager is at home with hospice attending. (See later email updates) Please keep Dave and Judy in your thoughts and prayers also. Finally, please keep our shipmates who are unable to attend Laffey functions any longer in your thoughts too: We are all getting older and it is becoming more difficult to travel extensively.

### WORK PARTY RECAP APRIL 15-23, 2016

Mike Pereira, Bob Langevin, and I arrived on Thursday 14 April 16 to get things underway. We had an all hands work party (all 3 of us!) and got everything brought aboard and stowed. Dave (Billy the Boot) and Mary Bossard came in with all of the ship store shirts, hats and other stuff. Of course Billy would show up after we had everything else aboard!!

All of the other "workers" started to arrive on Friday. It was a revolving door for a while, some coming and some leaving after the weekend. A memorial program was held on the fantail on Saturday 16 April 2016 to recall and relate the story about the 71<sup>st</sup> anniversary of the attack by 22 Kamikazes on our Laffey. Approximately 100 guests/visitors attended the memorial program. The proceedings were covered by both local TV and Patriots Point Video.

This year is the first that I can remember where we offered to buy our own paint. Jeff Jacobs is "THE MAN" when it comes to scrounging up donations: I don't know how he does it! We had a few area paint companies check into what we needed, but couldn't get any "donations"! Jeff called me and told me that he found International Paint Company in Norfolk that would donate 30 gallons of haze gray and 15 gallons of deck gray. We cannot thank Jeff and International Paint Company enough for their efforts and donation!

We must have had a communication problem concerning when the paint was to be delivered. We had 25 guys shooting daggers at me when there was no paint to work with. However, "Big Mike Pereira" came up with enough prep work to keep a bunch of them working. Jeff also got a power washer donated to us for the weekend to get the superstructure power washed before we painted it. Hughes Equipment Rental in Mt. Pleasant, SC lent us a 4000 PSI washer. The Hughes folks were just top notch and treated us like royalty.

Tuesday morning the paint arrived. It was 12:15 PM and the crew immediately jumped into action. I have never witnessed such a feat: The crew painted the entire superstructure on the main deck in 6 ½ hours. It was an amazing thing to see. Our work party people are just amazing! They all should receive our sincerest appreciation! All I can say is,

the folks at Patriots Point couldn't believe their eyes when they came in on Wednesday morning.

We sure missed old work party members: John Hudak, Don Watson and Davie Harhager. Dave was in the hospital in Florida and then on his way home to Western Maryland. John, being a great shipmate and brother, drove Dave, in Judy Trout's new RV, from Florida to Maryland to his northern home. Donnie was claiming to have a problem with his knee but I think he was just lazy!

I was lost without my brothers but the young shipmates kept things going and got a lot done. Ed Fitzsimmons brought two of his sons, Bill and Bobby, along with his grandson Mason. We nicknamed Mason "Minnion" as he looked like one with his goggles and dust mask. He was a human dynamo. Ah, how energy is wasted on the young. These guys prepped and painted the 5" director. It looked great when they finished.

We even had some work for Jill Michel and Hilary Wagner to do before the paint arrived. Unfortunately, Jill had to leave to return to work before the paint arrived. We had a pool going as to when the paint would arrive and Jill won the money when she guessed 1PM. It was the closest without going over the time. I really think she knew the truck driver and told him what time to get there.

I really must commend Mike Pereira for the way he handled the paint situation. He wasn't there to make friends and was really a tough leader. He set the guys up in teams having some paint the rivets, some cut in, some with small rollers and some with large rollers. He did everything but use a whip but the guys really got down and worked. You have to work hard in order to paint all that they did in 6 ½ hours. The next morning Mike apologized to everyone for the way he acted. I think everyone knew what he was trying to do and were proud of what they had accomplished. Mike really showed everyone how to paint as a team!

I have to extend a special thanks to the Langevin family. Bob brought a truckload of supplies and he gave me an SUV load to bring down also. He had paper products, canned goods, paint supplies, foodstuffs: You name it, Bob had it donated. He arrived with 4 bayonets for the small arms locker, slings for the M-1's and Thompsons too, ammo boxes and helmets for the small arms locker display.

Bob's brother Donn donated two boat hooks for the motor whale boat. They were painted up and put on display on the motor whale boat. He also had 4 fenders and two life preservers to hang on the whale boat too that were donated by Brother John. John Langevin donated \$500.00 for the web gear and whale boat equipment. It really looks great. This family is just outstanding. Thanks a lot to all the Langevins!!

Bob Langevin did his thing - mostly alone. He did additional restoration in the small arms locker, restored the foam locker (damage control) amidships with painted helmets and foam cans. Ken McCullough and Chris Kirhagis helped with these tasks. They also worked on putting the empty shell casing bags on the 20MM guns. Kirhagis also helped Bob with the installation of the motor whale boat equipment.

I have to mention the shower mats and rug that Bob brought and put in the CPO shower. The rug has a big anchor on it. Such class!!!! Did I mention that Bob cooked for us a few times? It was "terrible": He "made us eat" steak one night and shrimp creole another night. Things are really tough when you are roughing it folks!

Ken Rohloff and first timer Tom Aust performed a miracle: They put oxygen bottles in their holders in the after engine room and two bottles in the after emergency diesel room. We looked at the space they had to get these bottles put away and it seemed impossible. I left and went to the store to get more web gear for the small arms locker and when I came back the bottles were in place. They never did tell me how they did that???

Hank Ashton worked hard along with Ken McCullough doing whatever needed to be done, great painters too. Dave Tillinghast came in later in the week but made up for it by chipping, painting and anything else he could find. Steve Smith was first in line for the painting crew. Well, maybe not first but he was there. Steve did some prepping, cleaning and painting and a lot of joking. He is one funny guy.

Sgt. Major Terry Wade told us that he was Sgt. Major for General James Livingston in the 80's when he was a Colonel. They spoke on the phone. It was kinda neat. I hope they can work it out to meet for coffee someday. Terry did a lot of prepping and painting also. He works really well for a Jarhead!

Terry's buddy, Bob Johnson always supplies the potato chips at every work party. He didn't fail us this time either. Bob is a good friend of Barry Shugarts. 

#### DO WE HAVE ANYTHING LIKE THIS??!!

Russia's upgraded Kirov-class cruisers will be among the deadliest vessels on the planet, fitted with 80 anti-ship missiles and highly advanced air defenses.

The US Navy's aircraft carriers are the envy of navies across the globe. But nearly as desired are Russia's rare *Kirov*-class battlecruisers. They're nearly as long as an *Iowa*-class battleship, but where America's ancient monsters relied on nine 16-inch guns to hit targets 23 miles away, the *Kirov*-class' main armament is 20 P-700 Granit antiship cruise missiles. These weapons have a range

of nearly 400 miles, making them *very* worthy of NATO's nickname, the Shipwreck.

Despite being a tremendous threat to any surface ship across the globe, Russia only fields one of its four *Kirovs*, the *Pyotr Veliky* (Russian for Peter the Great, shown above). While the *Peter the Great* is serving as the flagship of the Russian Northern Fleet, its sistership, the *Admiral Nakhimov*, is undergoing an exhaustive refit. She should be ready to set sail by 2019, at which point the Pytor Veliky will receive the same set of upgrades. And yes, both ships are going to be far more deadly.

Boone Hall Plantation was founded in 1681 when Englishman Major John Boone came to Charleston and established a lucrative plantation and gracious home on the banks of Wampacheone Creek. The family and descendants of Major Boone were influential in the history of South Carolina, the colonies and the nation. The McRae family is proud to present that history, covering over 330 years, on a daily basis.

Boone Hall Plantation is also one of America's oldest working, living plantations. They have been continuously growing and producing crops for over three centuries. Once known for cotton and pecans, they are still actively producing strawberries, tomatoes, and pumpkins, as well as many other fruits and vegetables for visitors to enjoy.

The McRae Family purchased the plantation in 1955 and it was Mrs. McRae who furnished the house with antiques and began giving tours. Today, the McRae Family still owns the property, and they continue to make improvements to the plantation so that visitors can experience what plantation life was like. The knowledgeable staff will help you understand the day to day activities of those who lived on plantations as well as the history of the people who lived here at Boone Hall.
