SONNY FONDLY REMEMBERS HIS CAPTAIN

Captain Tazewell was the captain of the Laffey 1960-62. I was told by many of his officers (after our service of course) how much they respected him as a gentleman and a great skipper. He was also very fair to those of us who stood before him at captain's mast.

I remember when we started 1A.S. There was the Captains' Net. Captain Tazewell called to Radio Central to have an RM sent up to the bridge: It happened to be me.

He made me a talker on the Captains' Net: Me - an 18 year old RMSN talking on the net with all the other captains. Captain Tazewell told me that he had a ship to con and didn't have time to talk on the phone. We would give the other ship's our position on the target and what we were going to do. I also wrote on the board with a grease pencil as to where the contact was. It was cool to be up there and watch all of the action.

While in the Red Sea we got an "SOS" call from a passenger liner. We steamed all night and arrived at dawn. The ship was afire. There was a British destroyer on scene fighting the fire. Capt. Tazewell was bringing us in on our port side to assist in fighting the fire. The Brit captain told us to stand-off because they had the situation under control. They obviously did not. Capt. Tazewell told them that he didn't care what they said: We were there to help put out the fire. Very rarely did he make waves but he sure did that time.

The captain was transferred while we were in the yards for FRAM. One day everyone was buzzing that a "Four Striper" was aboard. I looked out of the Radio Central door and down the passageway came Captain Tazewell. I smiled and said "Captain Tazewell", He said "Are you still here Walker?" I told him that I had become a piece of the radio central furniture. He laughed and told me that he was glad to see me as an RM2.

A year or so after I was discharged I drove a bus load of kids from church to D.C. We rented bikes and were riding on the C&O canal trail. I was trailing the pack to keep an eye on a bunch of teenagers when I saw a familiar figure walking his dog. I slammed on the brakes of the bike and shouted "CAPTAIN TAZEWELL!" He looked up and said "Radioman from the LAFFEY". I told him my name and he remembered me.

I asked him if he had made Admiral yet and he told me that he was passing it up to become a civilian. We talked for a couple of minutes and I told him that I had to catch up to the group. It was years later when Dave Harhager and I drove to Norfolk to see him. We had a great visit.

We had a work party in 2004. Don Watson was working in the engine room painting. Captain and Mrs. Tazewell visited the ship. I took them below to see the progress of the engine room. I hollered down to Donnie "Donnie, look who's here", Don looked up and smiled and said "Captain Tazewell, I'm still here working off that extra duty you gave me 40 years ago!!!" We all had a good laugh.

I think it was 2005 when we got an idea to give the captain a surprise party. I called him to see if he was going to be home. He said sure. I told him that Dave and I were going to the ship and would like for him to go to dinner with us. He was delighted.

I got on the phone and called as many of our shipmates I could. We ended up with officers and enlisted guys showing up. They came from California, Ohio, Florida, New York, New Jersey, Maryland, Tennessee, Pennsylvania and all over. The night before the captain's party we had one of our own. It was really fun. Some of us played golf the next morning. It was hard for some of us to get up but we had fun.

That evening I drove to Capt. Tazewell's and picked him up, along with Mrs. Tazewell and Lt. Robison's widow.

We arrived at the hotel's restaurant. The doors opened and as we entered there was everyone lined up as side boys. Fred Nardei rang the bell and said "ding-ding, ding-ding, Laffey Arriving". Chief BM Doll (at 80 years old) piped the captain aboard. The captain turned to me and said "What is all of this?" I told him that it was all for him. There wasn't a dry eye in the place.

We presented him with a glass trophy with a nice inscription about how he turned boys into men and administered discipline to most of the guys that were there. I told him that most of us were discipline problems. He smiled and said "They make the best sailors!!!" It was great!

All I can say is he will be missed by all of us. Especially me as I really enjoyed the visits we had and the lunches too. It was special to sit and talk to someone that you totally respected.

The Market Hall has been described as a building of the "highest architectural design quality." Boone Hall Plantation was founded in 1681 when Englishman Major John Boone came to Charleston and established a lucrative plantation and gracious home on the banks of Wampacheone Creek. The family and descendants of Major Boone were influential in the history of South Carolina, the colonies and the nation. The McRae family is proud to present that history, covering over 330 years, on a daily basis.

Boone Hall Plantation is also one of America's oldest working, living plantations. They have been continuously growing and producing crops for over three centuries. Once known for cotton and pecans, they are still actively producing strawberries, tomatoes, and pumpkins, as well as many other fruits and vegetables for visitors to enjoy.

The McRae Family purchased the plantation in 1955 and it was Mrs. McRae who furnished the house with antiques and began giving tours. Today, the McRae Family still owns the property, and they continue to make improvements to the plantation so that visitors can experience what plantation life was like. The knowledgeable staff will help you understand the day to day activities of those who lived on plantations as well as the history of the people who lived here at Boone Hall.
